The physicians who occupied important roles within bureaucracies at both national and subnational levels were a significant catalyst for change. These physicians were able to convince and mobilize other political actors to promote decentralization, and encouraged the implementation of universal healthcare coverage in Brazil. Are there lessons that Canada can draw from the Brazilian case?
