Saskatchewan Municipalities Sustainability Index

This index will provide an open-access mapping of Saskatchewan policies that broadly address the United Nations' 17 sustainable development goals. It will act as a measurement framework for tracking future initiatives.

Issue Briefs

Four issue briefs will be released to help people understand the issues municipalities face when addressing sustainability.

- 1. Municipalities and Sustainability** will discuss the importance of sustainability and municipalities' preparedness to respond to sustainability.
- 2. Sustainability and Underserved Populations** will discuss sustainability development, the United Nations' sustainable development goals, and their importance for municipalities.
- 3. Sustainability and Skill Training** will discuss municipalities' role as key drivers for achieving sustainable development.
- 4. Municipalities, Sustainability Barriers and Facilitators** will discuss barriers to sustainability and the importance of partnerships to achieving sustainability.

Stakeholder Database

This searchable database will be a resource to help Saskatchewan municipalities develop and implement their own sustainability plans and stay connected.

It will include funding sources, government resources, innovations, and connections. It will be a starting point for forming valuable partnerships and a way to access others who have already implemented successful sustainable development goals.
