Access to Quality Healthcare for People who are Trans and Gender Diverse in Saskatchewan

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Policy Brief: CONTEXT

- The health care system is under stress, with timely access to care a major public issue
- Research indicates people who are trans and gender-diverse
 (PTGD) are medically underserved in Saskatchewan
- They face three key health challenges:
 - ofinding inclusive and affirming primary care;
 - ofinding inclusive and affirming specialist care and;
 - ofinding care related to other social, economic, and policyrelated factors
- As a result, they have increased likelihood for comorbidities and more frequent healthcare visits, in part because transition related care requires a strong relationship with a healthcare provider



Policy Brief: CONSIDERATIONS

- What is gender-affirming care?
 - "Any combination of social, legal, and medical measures that help people feel happy, healthy, and safe in their gender."
- An important barrier to affirming primary care also lies in health care practitioners' comfort in providing trans-specific healthcare.
- PTGD also experience bureaucratic barriers and long wait times in accessing essential specialist care.
- PTGD more likely to require mental health services relative to the general population
 - Higher prevalence of mental health challenges depression, anxiety disorders and suicidality, related to oppression and marginalization.

- With the health care system facing significant broad-based challenges – lack of access to family doctors, over-crowded emergency wards, long surgical wait times – where should PTGD be in the hierarchy of priorities?
- How can public/political support be created for PTGD health issues?
- Is there a role for the medical profession to take a leadership role in raising awareness of health issues for PTGD individuals?
