## Context

- Relationships and trust are critical for prosperity
- Physical and human capital are key ingredients to growth
- Social capital, our connections to each other, is necessary to build trust
- Research shows that public trust has been declining in Canada
- Issue is the need to build social capital if we are to strengthen trust

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## Considerations

- Studies have found some counter-intuitive results on social capital
  - Too much social bonding can actually be an impediment to innovation
  - A strong network of people can be resistant to change
  - We live in a time when the trend is to fewer, more intense relationships
- Physical (things) and human (skills) are critical to progress
- But cannot produce benefits when severed from social capital
- Need relational connections and trust to get full benefit of skills and resources
- Example of familial ties
  - Lack of social capital transfer when ties between parents and children are weak
